A NORTH Colchester village has been named in the top ten places to live in the East of England.

Nayland is one of nine other towns and villages included in the Sunday Times Best Places to Live, which will be published this weekend.

Residents are not surprised, saying the village has a lot going for it.

"There is a lovely diverse community and there are thriving organisations for every possible leisure or past-time," said John Alexander, chairman of the Nayland Conservation Society.

"When you move to Nayland, it is only a matter of time before someone knocks on your door to invite you to some event or other. People are very close."

Mr Alexander, of Fen Street, Nayland, said the village had been well protected by the conservation society: "It has stopped a lot of adverse development of one form or another. The same cannot be said for Colchester."

Even though Nayland is just seven miles away from Colchester, Mr Alexander said many residents look to Sudbury as their nearest town.
